Time for an email/newsletter update on our very productive Ashland/Bayfield/Sawyer County activities so far this fall! Keep your eye on our website for League activities and calendar events.

IT'S BEEN A VERY BUSY FALL ...

Here is an update on our activities:

The League moved back into in-person public education events, one on September 26 on the potential of the Inflation Reduction Act in moving our counties forward to handle climate change, the other on October 18th presenting the danger to Medicare solvency from the stealthy move by the insurance industry to privatize Medicare through the Medicare Advantage plans.

Our two standing Committees -Natural Resources and Voter Services have also been hard at work in September and October.

And likewise the four Units - Ashland, Bayfield, Washburn and Sawyer County are meeting regularly. Our membership remains strong and continually growing.

League members also participated in coalitions on other issues notably with the Climate Change Lobby for a GOTV event at Northland College and members joining local Reproductive Rights rallies.



ALAS, NO LWV/ABC HOLIDAY PARTY AGAIN THIS YEAR!

Weighing the continuing threat from "super spreading illness" and that impact on attendance, the League Board voted on November 15 to cancel plans for the annual Holiday Party.


o September 26 (Vaughn Library Ashland) - Local Vision and Implication of the Inflation Reduction Act. An excellent panel shared their plans to move forward on climate change preparation and mitigation. Steve Sandstrom represented the Bayfield County Board. Chris Kopel spoke as the CEO of Bayfield Electric Coop, Bill Bailey shared his extensive experience with local renewable energy projects and Philomena Kebec gave a perspective from the Bad River Tribe. It was encouraging to hear how all are working hard on the transition to alternatives to fossil fuels.

October 18 (Washburn Library) - Medicare and the Threats to Health Security for Seniors/Privatization of Medicare. Another set of excellent presenters walked the audience through how the Medicare Advantage program and other unpublicized initiatives in Washington have transferred delivery of Medicare services to private insurance agencies at much greater cost to taxpayers which threatens to bankrupt Medicare. Dr. Mark Neumann from Physicians for a National Health Plan and Karen Kirsch, Health care Organizer for Citizen Action of WI were the virtual presenters.



Natural Resources





The League of Women Voters of Ashland and Bayfield Counties Natural Resources Advocacy Committee has received statewide recognition for its efforts to protect clean water and move forward on planning for climate change.

- Clean Water Resolution. On the Committee's initiative to the Bayfield County Board, Bayfield County residents successfully passed an advisory Clean Water resolution on November 8. It requests that the WI Legislature "establish a right to clean water to protect human health, the environment, and the diverse cultural and natural heritage of Wisconsin." Five counties have already passed it - Marquette (73%), Wood (76%), Portage (77%), Eau Claire (79%), La Crosse(86%). Four other counties (Adams, Green, Juneau and Outagamie) also voted on the resolution on November 8.
 - Line 5 Opposition. The Committee continues working in a broad coalition with Tribes and WI environmental organizations to monitor the permitting process

Voter Services

Ashland and Bayfield Counties had some of the highest voter turnout in the state for this fall's election! Committee members broke into three local groups (Sawyer County, Ashland and Bayfield/Washburn): Sawyer County devotes its efforts exclusively to Voter Registration and Information. Ashland and Bayfield/Washburn focused on getting as many people as possible to participate in the November 8 Midterm Elections. The committee, which met via Zoom the third Friday of each month, supported these efforts:

- \geq Candidate Forums: Despite numerous attempts by the Candidate Forum Team to reach out to the candidates from both parties, it was unable to recruit both candidates on the ballot for the 74TH Assembly and the 25TH Senate Districts. At the request of Bad River voters, a potential candidate forum for Tribal Government elections became a Meet and Greet opportunity facilitated by League members. In the end, five of the six candidates for three offices, Vice Chair, Secretary and Council Member participated, exceeding the number of community members who attended! Nonetheless, it was a great opportunity to nurture the League's relationship with the tribe, while supporting democracy and informed voting.
- **Registration/Voter Information:** \geq Tables were set up throughout Ashland, Bayfield and Sawyer Counties including at Ashland High School, Lac Courtes Oreilles College, Northland College, Northwood Technical College, Honor the Earth Pow Wow, the Ashland Area Farmers' Market and several businesses. Yard signs urging community members to vote were made widely available. These include bilingual ones in Ojibwe/English, created by our local League, and in Spanish/English provided by the

Our four Units are digging into issues most relevant to their locale. They are also providing a welcome opportunity for members to informally discuss the bigger state and national issues.

Here are the meeting dates for the Units with a mention of some the issues that have been discussed:

- Washburn Unit. Meets monthly on the third Tuesday of the month at 2 PM at the Washburn Public Library. Next Meeting-Tuesday, December 20. Issues being discussed: local affordable housing shortage/ City Council proposal to expand Thompson West End Park RV rental space onto undeveloped land between Holman Drive and the lake, and school board and city budget issues.
- Bayfield Unit. Has been meeting bimonthly. Will take December off and resume in January with date to be set. Focus has been on voter registration and information for the mid-term elections, setting up voter education displays and sending flyers in CORE food boxes. They also attended 2 cultural orientations with Dee Sweet, Carolyn Gouge and Laura Miranda to prepare for in depth canvassing at Red Cliff and Bad River. They also organized the LWV/ABC participation in the 2020 Apple Fest Parade.
- Ashland Unit. The Ashland Unit also focused on supporting voter services efforts for the mid-term elections. They tabled and did some get-out-the-vote outreach at Northland College at least 5 times, connected with Northwood Tech, collaborated with Wisconsin Native vote to knock doors at Bad River, and did election day GOTV in Ashland.

- Storm Sewer Clean up in Ashland. Work continues in monitoring City of Ashland work on replacing their polluting storm sewage system.
- Also monitoring and commenting on other water issues. Organizing to oppose Krystle Water withdrawal denial lawsuit. Also monitoring for any PFAs in our local water.

- GOTV: Members and friends of the committee worked hard to Get Out The Vote. The local chapter of Citizens Climate Lobby and The League of Women Voters of Ashland and Bayfield Counties cosponsored Earth Day: Election Edition at Northland College on October 22nd . League Members and Friends have also partnered WI Native Vote under the leadership of organizer Dee Sweet, to provide voter information in Red Cliff and Bad River.
- Sawyer County Unit. They are a hardworking, dedicated crew that also devoted their energies this fall to voter information, registration and GOTV.
